



Manager's Message

The winter season provides an endless number of recreational possibilities. Ice skating, snowshoeing, and building snowmen are some of the ideas that come to my mind. Of course, as a municipal manager, for me winter also means unpredictable weather that can cause residents and businesses to be landlocked for days.

Beaver Borough has 20 miles of roadways and over 4.5 miles of alleys (both private and public) to service when mother nature strikes. In order to help us maintain and keep these thoroughfares safe, we ask that residents please keep these few considerations in mind during the winter months:

- Stay back at least 40 feet from the rear of the plow truck so the driver can see you.
- If you can, park in the driveway. Cars in the roadway hinder snow removal operations.

- Avoid passing plow trucks. It is distracting for the driver and dangerous.
- When shoveling your sidewalks, avoid placing snow back into the street. You will find that less snow is pushed back onto the sidewalks.
- Be patient. Snow and ice removal is a function of public works that ensures the safety of all visitors in Beaver Borough.

Happy New Year to our residents, businesses, and non-profit organizations! Thank you to all who participated in our fall tree planting project. Annually, the Beaver Tree Commission, coordinates spring and fall tree plantings to help replace those that are declining due to maturity and hazard conditions. Also, this past fall the street trees in the business district were pruned to improve pedestrian safety and storefront visibility.

During the winter season, when snowfall accumulations are heavy and deep, it is helpful to gently brush off excess snow on young trees and shrubs to maintain structural integrity. Winter and early spring provide good opportunities to examine trunk and branch quality in larger trees while the canopy is not full of leaves. Things to look for: broken, hanging branches; trunk damage, insect borer damage, woodpecker damage, and branches without bud development.

Looking ahead to spring, we will have our annual Arbor Day celebration on **Saturday, April 28**, at the gazebo. There will be many events, refreshments, and student activities. It's always encouraging to see the diversity of participants at this event. Please consider attending as we celebrate one of our town's greatest assets—our "Community Forest." The event is also an annual requirement for Beaver to be designated as a "Tree City USA" by the National Arbor Day Foundation.

We are also seeking volunteers to help with Arbor Day, tree planting, and maintenance of newly planted trees. Training will be provided. This is a great way to make a direct and visible impact that enhances Beaver for the next generation.

Sled Riding Notice

Just a reminder that the Borough's liability insurance required some changes to be made last year in regards to sled riding in town.

All sled riding and similar activity is **totally prohibited in Wayne Square Park** (corner of Beaver Street and River Road).

Sled riding is permissible in Roosevelt Park, but with the following restrictions:

1. The activity must occur within the marked course only.
2. The participant must be a resident of the Borough of Beaver. The course is not open to use by non-residents.
3. The activity is prohibited after sunset.
4. The activity is prohibited when the course is closed because of dangerous conditions, such as ice patches and/or bare spots.
5. All posted signs (such as "Course Closed") must be obeyed.
6. Any child under the age of twelve (12) must wear a protective helmet.
7. Inner tubes and metal or plastic disks are not permitted on the course.

Streetscape News

Clock Tower Facelift

The signature clock tower at College Avenue and Third Street shines like new after a complete power-wash and detailed repainting by Rick Granati. As well, all tower lighting has been renewed, including the illumination of the tower pinnacle. The 10-year-old clock tower replicates that of the 1877 Court House, which was destroyed by fire in 1932. It also displays the original bell, which was restored by Rome Metals Inc. The tower was given by the Michael Baker Corporation in memory of Michael Baker, Jr. The chimes were given by the I.B.E.W. in honor of International President Edwin D. Hill.

The Power of Light

Hopefully soon Beaver will have a brighter downtown. Borough Manager Whitney Brady recently applied for a \$125,000 grant from Duquesne Light, which, if awarded to the Borough, will enable us to retrofit the 83 ornamental light poles in the business district with new, redesigned LED light fixtures. These fixtures will replace the present incandescent light bulbs that each consume 100-watts of power with long-lasting, brighter, 36-watt LED fixtures. The new lighting will also be reconfigured to direct more of the lighting downward, while eliminating glare for motorists. The new system would result in an annual savings to the Borough of \$14,000 and, over a 10-year period, could total \$125,000. If the funding is awarded to the Borough, installation will begin as soon as possible, with 10 fixtures being replaced each week.

Best Seat in Town

In recent years, a total of 20 memorial benches have been purchased by local citizens and placed along Third Street. With continuous exposure to the elements, some benches have developed surface damages. Beginning this month, all the benches will be temporarily removed and returned to the manufacturer for refinishing, at no charge to the Borough. By early spring, all will be returned to their original places.

Newly Elected Officials Course

Four Beaver Borough Council members are taking part in the Newly Elected Officials Course (NEOC), which began on November 19, 2011, at the Pittsburgh Marriott City Center Hotel. Luke Berardelli, Jarrod Thomas, and Mike Deelo are enrolled in the 10-week certificate course; Pat Sims enrolled in the four-week, Saturdays-only course.

Offered by the Local Government Academy (localgovernmentacademy.org), the NEOC offers informative sessions on the many complex tasks that come with running a municipality. In the course, leaders from local, county, and state government, as well as professors from area colleges and universities and specialists from both the public and private sectors, teach participants about policy matters and the government process, as well as legal and fiscal responsibilities.

NEOC topics include:

- Understanding the extent and limitations of municipal power
- Rights and responsibilities under the Sunshine Act
- Techniques and procedures for running an effective meeting
- Tips on working with the media
- Municipal Finances
- Personnel Law
- Police & Public Safety
- Infrastructure
- Municipal Planning, Zoning, and Development
- Strategic Planning and Leadership
- Technology/Communication – Communicating with the public through newsletters and websites.

Upon completion of the course participants receive a certificate at a formal ceremony.

Beaver Valley River Response Task Force

What is the Beaver Valley River Response Task Force?

The Beaver Valley River Response Task Force is a new law enforcement team which has been formed to provide law enforcement coverage on the Ohio River from the Ohio line to the Montgomery Lock and Dam. The task force has received a \$140,000 grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the state Department of Economic and Community Development to obtain a patrol boat and start the project.

Who comprises the task force?

The task force is a cooperative effort between the Beaver Borough and Center Township police departments, who will work in cooperation with the Pennsylvania State Police and Medic Rescue ambulance service. The force also includes Vanport Township, which is patrolled by the Beaver police, and Potter Township, which is patrolled by the Center Township police. The task force members will be trained through coordinated training programs with the city of Pittsburgh's River Rescue program, the U.S. Coast Guard, and the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, as well as other local, state and federal agencies.

An officer on the new task force has a U.S. Coast Guard Merchant Marine license and has training and extensive knowledge of the waterways within the Port of Pittsburgh. This officer will act as a liaison between the various agencies and assist in further development of the task force.

Why does the community need the team?

Currently there is no local law enforcement patrolling the Ohio River. In the event of an emergency along the river, an emergency response team has to be called in from outside of Beaver County, which prolongs the response time of law enforcement in a crisis. The task force will be able to provide a local, rapid, coordinated regional response for a variety of law enforcement issues that could arise on the river, including catastrophic events or a terrorist attack.

There are many businesses located along the river, including the nuclear power plant in Shippingport and Conway Yards, which is the fifth largest rail yard in the United States. The Army Corps of Engineers and Waterways Council Inc. estimates that 27 million tons of commerce worth over \$4.34 billion is transported through Beaver County on the Ohio River each year.

The goal of the Beaver Valley River Response Task Force is to discourage crime on the waterways and to make the waterways safer for the local residents and businesses. It will have daytime and nighttime patrols to provide law enforcement coverage on the water for the local chemical plants, oil and chemical storage tanks and to assist with general waterway improvements and awareness. It will also patrol during large events such as the Beaver River Regatta and annual Fourth of July celebrations.

The task force will have a patrol boat and all necessary equipment including medical equipment, thermal imaging and night vision equipment. The patrols will provide the necessary law enforcement services needed to address the gaps in maritime security along the Ohio River in Beaver County.

1st Monday of the month: *River Rd. to south of Third St.*

2nd Monday of the month: *North of Third St. up to 7th St.*

Preparing Your Recyclables

Glass – Clear, Brown, and Green Bottles and Jars — Rinse, remove Styrofoam labels, metal lids, and rings. Do not break glass. Do not include auto glass, light bulbs, porcelain, ceramic, plate glass, or crystal.

Plastic Bottles and Jugs Only — Rinse thoroughly, remove caps. Flatten to save space. Containers must have the three-arrow recycling logo, with the number 1 or 2 inside it. Containers that originally held motor oil, antifreeze, or other chemicals are not recyclable. No plastic bags or buckets.

Aluminum, Bi-Metal, & Tin Food and Beverage Containers, and Aluminum Foil — Rinse thoroughly, crush cans. Place in blue recycling container.

Your recycling container is to be used for recycling only. Please recover your recycling container promptly after collection.

Note: *The recycling container remains the property of Beaver Borough and must remain at the residence if you move.*

History Corner

First Graveyard in Beaver County

(from *Milestones* Vol 26. No. 3)

The first graveyard in Beaver County was at McIntosh (now Beaver). It was known as the burial place of three colonial soldiers who deserted from old Fort McIntosh January 25, 1786. They were pursued and captured at the mouth of the Little Beaver, taken prisoner back to the fort. Major Wylis, who did not want to wait for a court martial, is said to have

ordered out a file of soldiers who shot them within an hour of their return. When Beaver was plotted, the northwest park covered the site of the three soldiers' graves and this became the old town cemetery.

2. Never dump anything down storm drains
3. Plant the bare spots in your yard
4. Compost your yard waste
5. Avoid pesticides; learn about Integrated Pest Management
6. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces
7. Use the car wash instead of washing your car in the driveway
8. Check your car for leaks, and recycle motor oil
9. Pick up after your pet
10. Have your septic tank pumped and inspected regularly

Citizen’s Police Academy

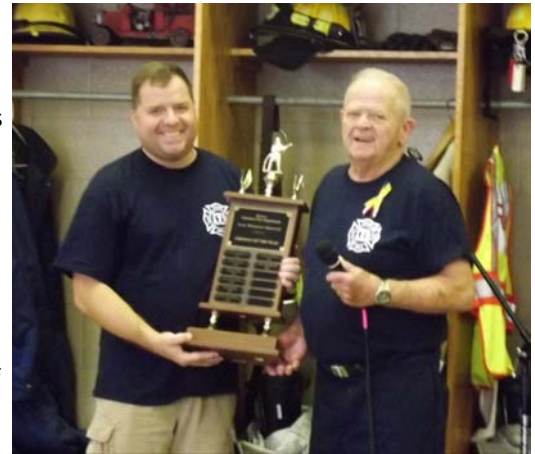
