Beaver Through and Through

BILL COOPER (1945-2014)



On July 16, Beaver lost one of its living treasures with the passing of Bill Cooper.

Born June 7, 1945 in Pittsburgh, Bill's first home in Beaver was at the corner of Market and Bank streets. Eventually his family moved out to Dutch Ridge Road, where he had the freedom to ride his beloved pony.

Bill first met his future wife, Susan, when they were in high school. "I made sure we met," says Susan, who was in the church choir with him. "I would count the number of sopranos and tenors and make sure that I was the soprano who sat by the tenors. He had no idea."

Bill and Susan were married on January 20, 1968. Three months later to the day, Bill left for Officer Candidate School during the Vietnam War.

Bill served two tours with the U.S. Navy. His first duty was on an ocean going tug that was used for salvage operations and for towing practice targets out to sea. During his second tour, he was promoted to supply officer and coordinated underway replenishments for food, fuel, and ammunition.

Bill was discharged in March 1971, and by the end of the month was working at Pollock's Typewriter & Office Supply, where he'd stay for the next 43 years.

Anyone who knew Bill knew that he lived to help others. "He was an exceptionally kind person to everyone," says Susan. "He could be upset about something and pacing at the store, and then someone would come in and you'd never know it. He wanted to take care of you."

Bill Cooper's legacy is one that will live on for many years to come. Those of us who were lucky enough to know him are better people for it.

"When I opened my business in Beaver, it was Bill and Susan Cooper who made me feel so welcome. Bill will be greatly missed in our town. He was our Chamber watchdog." – JAMIE LAUGHLIN

Beaver to Once Again Host Vietnam Veterans Memorial "The Wall that Heals"– Sept. 24–28

On Veterans Day, 1996 the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund unveiled a half-scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. This memorial is designed to travel to communities throughout the United States. Since its dedication, the Traveling Wall, or the Wall that Heals has visited more than 350 communities throughout the nation, allowing

millions the opportunity to see this amazing memorial that they may otherwise never have the opportunity to see.

Now, thanks to the Vietnam Veterans of America, Beaver County Chapter #862 (which, by the way, is the largest VVA Chapter in Pennsylvania and the third largest chapter in the USA), Beaver will once again be hosting this event. The wall will be here from September 24-28. The opening ceremony will be on September 24 at 7 p.m. in Quay Square. There will be various displays including vintage military vehicles during the week. The event will culminate with a memorial "Ride to the Wall", allowing hundreds of motorcycle enthusiasts to replicate the ride to the wall held in Washington, D.C. each year to honor the fallen troops who served their country during Vietnam. Beaver Area Police Department Citizen's Police Academy

WHAT IS THE CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY?

The Citizen's Police Academy (CPA) is an informative, ten week classroom series that gives an inside look at the Beaver Area Police Department operations while discussing the principles of community policing. The purpose of the class is to promote a greater awareness and better understanding of local law enforcement's continuously changing role in the community.

It is the belief of the Beaver Area Police Department that education is most effective in gaining understanding and support from the community. The CPA offers insight into how police officers perform their duties and how the department serves the community.

MISSION OF THE ACADEMY

The purpose of the CPA is to foster better communication between citizens and police through education. The academy will create a nucleus of well-informed citizens who possess greater insight into police practices and services. Graduates of the academy can share their knowledge and experiences with the community as the opportunity arises. Everyone benefits from enhancing citizen understanding of the role and function of their police department.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Presented in a friendly, casual environment, the class covers a wide variety of subject areas including police communications, criminal law and procedures (laws of arrest), street crime enforcement/investigations, field identification, youth programs, and more. Graduates will receive a certificate of completion.

Instruction consists of one 3-hour class held each week, from 6 to 9 p.m. for a duration of 10 weeks. The instruction is comprehensive, covering a different area of police work each week. Certified police officers, supervisors, and civilian instructors with particular expertise will conduct each topic.

REQUIREMENTS OF PARTICIPATION

- Minimum 18 years of age
- No felony convictions
- No misdemeanor convictions within one year of application
- Applicants must agree to criminal background check (no charge)

Applications can be picked up at the Beaver Police Station. Class starts September 8 and continues for 10 weeks on Mondays from 6-9 p.m.



Beaver's Code Enforcement Committee Developing a Draft Rental Registration Ordinance

Beaver's Code Enforcement Committee is working on a draft ordinance similar to those in effect in other towns throughout the state including Beaver Falls, Berwick, and Patterson Township. These ordinances are intended to (1) ensure the fitness and safety of rental units for occupancy, (2) help preserve the quality of housing stock in the community and to prevent housing blight, (3) ensure that municipal officials can reach the owner or manager of a rental unit if there are problems with the unit itself or with its occupants, and (4) aid law enforcement in dealing with problem tenants.

Once the Committee has developed a first draft for circulation, copies will be disseminated to interested parties including landlords for review and comment. In addition, the Committee will hold a number of public comment meetings while the initial circulation draft is reviewed and revised. At the end of this process, the Committee will submit the revised draft to council for further review, comment and ultimately consideration. This process will take a number of months.

Helping Beaver Borough Residents Stay Warm In Winter

Columbia Gas of Pennsylvania is replacing natural gas distribution pipes across the state of Pennsylvania. In 2014 alone, Columbia Gas will invest \$188 million in the Keystone State, with \$145 million being dedicated to our infrastructure replacement. Beaver Borough is one of the many communities that will benefit from the Company's aggressive replacement program this year.

June of 2014 launched a \$620,000 pipeline improvement project in Beaver Borough, Beaver County. Columbia

Gas is currently in the midst of replacing approximately 2,340 feet of existing steel pipe with state-of-the-art plastic pipe along Third Street, Dravo Avenue, Corporation Street, Navigation Street, and Buffalo Street. This new pipe will enhance the reliability of natural gas service in the Borough.

As part of the mainline replacement, 83 customers will directly benefit from customer service line replacements and upgrades. These customers receive face-to-face notification prior to the start of the project and will be notified again prior to

any temporary gas interruptions.

Weather permitting, the entire project including restoration work is expected to be completed by the beginning of late

Senior Citizen Passes

Beaver Area School District residents who are age 62 or older are eligible to receive a Senior Citizen Pass valid for free general admission to district football games, basketball games, and concerts.

To verify age and obtain a pass, the resident must show a birth certificate, driver's license, or Medicare card.

Passes are valid as long as residency is maintained in the Beaver Area School District and do not need to be renewed each year.

Important Message from the Beaver Police Department

The Beaver Police Department wants to warn the community about a rise in telemarketing scams and identity theft. Fraudulent telemarketers often look for seniors to prey upon since they are likely to have retirement savings, good credit, and the time to talk on the phone. Many telemarketers are very aggressive, persuasive, and intimidating. Keep in mind: if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. You have the right to refuse calls from telemarketers. Just say “no” and hang up the phone. Note: Often a person who has sent money to a fraudulent telemarketer will continue to get telemarketing phone calls. Fraudulent telemarketers have been known to sell lists of easy targets to other scammers placing those victims at risk for further abuse.

Beware: As a common rule, never buy anything over the phone unless you initiated the call.

IDENTITY THEFT

One of the fastest growing frauds – identity theft – can be financially and emotionally devastating. The identity thief attempts to obtain your personal information, such as your birth date, credit card and social security numbers. With this information, the imposter can assume your identity and establish credit or bank accounts in your name. Seniors can be victimized

by unscrupulous caregivers or others who can steal mailed credit applications and fraudulently use them and other personal information to make purchases or borrow money.

PROTECT YOURSELF

Shred all unwanted mail as soon as it is received, particularly unsolicited credit applications.

Have mail delivered to the post office box and have it picked up on a regular basis. Never leave mail out for pick-up. Thieves can steal your mail and gain access to your personal identification information, including bank account numbers. They also can tamper with personal checks, altering them in order to steal your money. Be careful about giving out personal information, including your address, social security number, or bank account numbers.

Provide this information only when absolutely necessary and only to a business or agency you know to be legitimate. Avoid giving out this information on sweepstakes application cards, commercial surveys, or over the Internet. Immediately report identity theft to the Beaver Police Station.

History Corner

COLONEL RICHARD P. ROBERTS (1820-1863)

Colonel Richard P. Roberts was born June 6, 1820, in Beaver County. He pursued a career in law and took to the bar in 1848. Eventually, he was appointed to the position of District Attorney of Beaver County.

On May 1, 1851, Roberts married Caroline Henry and they had three children, but only Emma, born in 1854, made it past infancy. Tragedy struck again when Caroline died on Feb. 4, 1862.

After the failed Peninsula Campaign in the Civil War in 1862, Lincoln called for the recruitment of 600,000 men. Roberts singlehandedly recruited 300 hundred Beaver County men who joined with recruits from Mercer, Green, and Washington Counties to form the 140th Division.

Roberts was voted Colonel of the regiment and on May 1, 1863, the 140th fought at the battle of Chancellorsville in Virginia. Defeated, the Union Army retreated across the Rappahannock River to safety. The brutal battle made Roberts gravely ill and he was sent away on medical leave. While he was gone, orders came to pursue Gen. Lee, who was headed towards Pennsylvania. Roberts immediately departed the hospital and rejoined his regiment in Maryland.

The Union Army met the Confederates at the Battle of Gettysburg on July 2, 1863. While holding Stony Hill at the Battle of the Wheatfield, Roberts was recorded saying, "My brave boys, you are upon your native soil, your own Pennsylvania. Drive back the Rebel invaders!" The 140th charged, helping the rest of General Caldwell's men hold Stony Hill. It was during this charge that Roberts fell at 6 p.m., with sword in hand, only 20 feet from where a monument to the 140th stands to this very day. Had the 140th division under General Caldwell not been at Stony Hill, the battle of Gettysburg might have ended very differently.

Col. Roberts' courage and sacrifice will long be remembered in the hearts of the men and women of Beaver County.

The Beaver Area Heritage Museum—an all volunteer organization—is having a very active summer. Just a few of the activities that have taken place or are scheduled are related to the Education component of the Museum. Approximately 450 first and third graders attended the field trips that were coordinated by Marge Carver Stuck and her corps of volunteers.

The Museum garden is flourishing with an abundance of beautiful flowers and wonderful vegetables with plantings that would have been available during the time of the Log House families. Jean Lloyd tends her 1802 garden daily to maintain its beauty and originality.

The exhibits have rotated through a series of collections from Beaver Area residents and their interests over the past several months and Director Eileen Rillo and her committee is planning a few more surprises for the remainder of the year.

Diana Neel has accepted an appointment to the Board of Trustees and will be working as a liaison with the Passenger Station Committee.

The Collections Management Committee members under the direction of Midge Sefton have catalogued 30,200 artifacts into the data base at the Museum. This number does not include those related to the Loan from the Michael Baker Corporation that includes records and artifacts from the early 1940's until the end of 2013. A group of Baker retirees is working under the direction of Chuck Snitger to catalog those artifacts. The Collections Management Committee also works with Geneva College to teach interns who have an interest in History. To date there have been 8 interns and we are looking forward to hosting another intern during the fall semester.

There are many groups that have rented the Log House for events or taken private tours through the Museum and Log House.
