Making Sure They Aren't Forgotten



hey were just boys. Twenty-seven in all. They left Beaver to fight in World War II and never came home. And now Ralph "Buss" Morton is doing what he can to make sure they're not forgotten.

Morton is a lifelong resident of Beaver, having lived in the same house along Taylor Avenue for all of his 94 years. In 1944 he was drafted into the Army and served in both the European and Pacific theaters with the 86th Infantry Division as first sergeant of the 342 Regiment. Now he maintains the WWII monument in Beaver's Irvine Park to honor and remember the 27 young men who gave their lives. "I was one of the lucky ones to come home so I could make sure the others aren't forgotten—at least in my lifetime."

"These guys would all be around my age now," he says. "That's why I'm still carrying a torch for them."

Back in the mid-2000s, the WWII monument was in poor shape. In a project he called "The Anzio Project" in honor of his friend **Stephen J. Anzio**, a Navy rear-gunner who was killed when his plane was shot down off the coast of Spain in July of 1943, Morton worked to have the monument redone.

"It turned out to be quite a project," says Morton, who says it took months to complete and hours of researching the VA records. "But it was worthwhile. It's a beautiful, deserving monument to the memory of all those guys."

Originally the memorial was erected in 1953 by members of the old Philip J. Davidson American Legion post, which used to be in Beaver. It was refurbished and officially rededicated on Memorial Day in 2009 with a new bronze plaque, donated by the Beaver Area Heritage Foundation, listing the names of the 27 Beaver-area men killed during the war.

"I could be on that plaque, too," says Morton, "except I was one of the lucky ones to come home so I could make sure the others aren't forgotten—at least in my lifetime."

In addition to Anzio, Morton was good friends with seven of the men remembered on the monument:

Wilbert E. Black – "He was a farm boy from Brighton Township. We were both members of the Class of 1937. He was the captain of the football team, and I played fullback. He was killed on the beach during the invasion of Italy.

Frank Grdenich – "Frank was a Bridgewater boy and another 1937 classmate. He was also on the football team. His fighter plane was shot down over France."

William A. Lovell – "Bill was Beaver boy, a little younger. He couldn't wait to get into the war and joined the Canadian Air Force; eventually he transferred to the U.S. Air Force. He was shot down early on during the invasion of Africa."

John A. Roth – "His dad owned Roth's Meat Market, where Kretchmar's is today. John was a wonderful guy. Best dancer in the class. He was killed on the ground in France."

Hubert H. Washburn – "Hubert's dad was Dr. Washburn, whose office was at the corner of Wilson Avenue and Third Street. His brother Paul and I were BHS classmates. He was a medic in one of the airborne divisions. He and all the men on a plane going to a drop were shot down and died together."

James H. Williams – "Jim was from Brighton Township and served as a PBY pilot in the Pacific theater. He was once the boyfriend of my first wife, Betty Glass. His plane was shot out of the sky."

Editor's note: Ralph Morton passed away peacefully on April 19, surrounded by his family. I am grateful for the brief time I got to spend with him.

Protect Our Water

Beaver Borough Municipal Authority obtains its drinking water from groundwater wells. Source water protection can help prevent drinking water from becoming polluted by managing possible sources of contamination in the area that supplies water to a public well. Everyone has an important part to play in protecting drinking water, both today and for the future. Source water protection is a community effort – we hope you will help protect our water supply.

Ways to help – What can you do?

- Dispose of motor oil at a garage that will recycle it. Never pour oil on the ground or in a storm drain or sewer on the street.
- Bring household hazardous waste such as paint, varnishes, and other chemicals to a waste collection site.
- Minimize the use of pesticides and herbicides on your lawn and garden.
- Do not dump swimming pool water into a creek or storm drain at the end of the season. Slowly direct the water into the sanitary sewer.
- Remember: anything you throw or store on the ground can find its way into the groundwater. Store and handle chemicals properly.
- Call the Department of Environmental Protection at 412-442-4000 immediately if you observe a chemical spill.

Waste Disposal

oseph J. Brunner, Inc. offers waste disposal services to Beaver Borough residents. Trash service pick-up is once a week. A standard trash can or bag is 32 gallons. Anything larger will not be taken. For additional waste disposal needs, the Borough offers garbage bags for purchase. The bags are \$2.00 each and include the cost of disposal. When you fill up a Borough bag, just put it out on your normal trash day. You will not pay any extra fees except for the purchase of the bag.

Recycling & Waste

eaver is an environmentally friendly town. All residents are expected to take part in the town's recycling program. For your convenience, additional recycling containers are available at the Borough building. Additional recycling services are available at the Beaver County Waste facility at Brady's Run Park (724-770-2064). Visit beavercountypa. gov/waste-management for a listing of acceptable recyclable items including but not limited to: electronics, paper, glass, cardboard and used motor oil.

Building and Zoning Permits

ost construction work within the borough requires both zoning and state building applications. Since state forms are multi-copy, they cannot be placed on the Beaver Borough website; they must be picked up at the Borough office. The zoning application cannot be processed without the required state forms.

Generally, zoning and building permits are required for change of use or prior to construction activity such as rebuilding, moving, enlarging, or physically altering a building or other structure, including but not limited to:

- Major remodeling
- Changes to roofline
- Additions including garages/carports
- Fencing

• Sign

- Porch
- Deck or patio
- Swimming pool
- Storage building
- New electrical and plumbing
- Demolition

Maintenance activities, minor repairs or alterations that do not affect the basic structure of an existing building or increase the lot area coverage such as new siding, painting, re-roofing, landscaping, replacement doors or windows do not require a permit if same size.

This is not a complete listing. For specific answers to questions regarding your situation should contact Borough Zoning Officer Dan Martone at 412-292-6199.

Yard Waste Disposal

Beaver offers its residents a yard waste disposal facility along the Ohio River. This facility is for the disposal of yard wastes only such as grass, weeds, and branches. The access road to the facility is located at the corner of Beaver Street and River Road. Residents wishing to use the facility must purchase an annual dumping permit at the Borough building for \$20. Facility is available to Beaver Borough residents only – no contractors.

Sidewalk Rules

Il borough residents are responsible for keeping their sidewalks free of grass, weeds, snow, ice and any obstructions or dangerous conditions. Residents should contact Randy Morrow, code enforcement officer, at 724-601-9953 with any questions regarding rules governing the use and maintenance of curbs and sidewalks.

History Corner

RUDYARD KIPLING IN BEAVER COUNTY (Reprinted from Milestones, Vol 25. No. 4; source: bchistory.org)

From the Beaver Argus, April 16, 1899


During his boyhood in India, [Kipling] lived in the town where resided a daughter of Rev. Dr. R. T. Taylor, for many years president of Beaver College. Dr. Taylor's daughter was the wife of a civil servant attache at Hyderabad, and the two families by reason of their nationality became very intimate. After Mr. Kipling had left India and was making his home in England, shortly before he took up his residence in Vermont, he came to this country on a visit and reading tour. Beaver was among the places he visited, and he put in a fortnight or more there as the guest of Dr. Taylor and other prominent families in the valley.

Many interesting anecdotes are told of him since that time. His habits were naturally much influenced by the life he had lived in India. It is related that one morning just after he arrived, a messenger was sent from the house where he was a guest to a barber in the town to have him come with his tools and shave the distinguished literateur. The knight of the razor set off post-haste, supposing that his waiting customer was ill. He found him in bed, but in remarkable spirits for one who, as he thought, was too ill to sit up. As he was about to leave, he discovered that if there was any one ill in the residence it was not Mr. Kipling, and that his presence had been required simply because the creator of "Mowgli" and his jungle friend did not like to be shaved after he arose. The barber still tells with gusto of his daily visits to the famous Englishman.
