

Message from the Manager

Water and sewer services are vital to Beaver's residents. We expect clean water to flow from faucets and we expect waste water to flow without interruption to the sewage treatment plant. Rarely, however, do we think about the people behind the scenes – the operators, maintenance workers, supervisors, and engineers – who work continuously to keep those systems in good working order, both now and for the future.

Beaver's residents have enjoyed a very reliable water and sewer systems for a number of years. We can attribute this to some very forward thinking by Borough leaders in our past. Unlike some other western Pennsylvania communities, Beaver is fortunate to have separate storm water and sanitary waste systems. This separate storm water system prevents overloading of the sewage treatment plant during periods of heavy rain. However, some leakage, known as infiltration and inflow, does occur. Therefore it is important to minimize the amount of

storm water entering the town's sanitary sewer system.

The Borough routinely monitors, flushes, and repairs the systems as needed. Most recently we have engaged a company to monitor water infiltration into the sanitary sewer system. Unfortunately, due to infiltration from springs, downspouts, and unmonitored drains, the Borough routinely processes more waste water than necessary. Through the use of monitors placed in key locations, we expect to be able to track down the locations of unknown sources of infiltration. In addition to the monitors, other methods of leak detection, including smoke or dye testing, is being used to pinpoint the sources of the infiltration.

The Department of Environmental Protection mandates communities to keep storm water and sanitary sewage separate. Residents can rest assured that the Borough will comply with these regulations.


Future steps will include:

- A community assessment of priorities and attitudes elicited from residents and business owners via traditional paper survey method and an online survey to increase the amount of participation.
- A community public meeting led by planning consultants Pashek and Associates, scheduled for Monday, Feb. 17, 2014, will provide an overview of the survey results and give attendees the opportunity to comment and present additional ideas.

Clearly all Borough residents, property owners, and business owners have a vested interest in this important project. Please make an effort to have a hand in guiding the future of our town.

Beaver Station Update



In May 2013 the Heritage Foundation purchased the 1897 P&LE railroad station, a landmark two-acre property, which will soon be available to the community as **Beaver Station – a multi-use cultural and event center**.

In October work started on the slate roof and copper gutter system of the 1897 Station. This very visible element is a vital first step in the preservation of this iconic historic structure. This \$135,000 project is being partially funded by a \$25,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission.

We are now beginning the renovation of the balance of the lower level. The Beaver County Genealogy and History Center relocated

to the renovated 911 Center "bunker" in July and became our first income producing tenant. They are very pleased with the space and have experienced a record 30 percent increase in visitors in their first three months of occupancy.

Most gratifying of all is the early support from the community. As of early December 2013, we already have some 125 commitments totaling over \$835,000! Additional funding is needed to reach our primary goal of \$1,750,000 and to realize our vision for the elegant upper level and grounds. This phase will include costly features such as the main event room, new restrooms, a catering kitchen and exterior landscaping including a rear courtyard, event lawn, historic belvedere and the promenade connecting it to the station and museum. This attractive event venue will generate income for the Foundation so it and Beaver Station can continue to enrich community life for years to come.

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
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
